#### Friends,

December is finally here! We have officially hung the greens. The season of Advent marks the beginning of a new church year (and my first year in ministry with y'all) in which we reflect anew on the meaning of the incarnation, ministry, suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus for us. In the season of Advent we focus on the threefold coming of Jesus Christ to the world in the flesh, as a newborn baby to earthly parents.

While it seems we are so far from the cross here at Jesus' birth. One of our younger disciples asked quite the question after one of my sermons a few weeks ago, "Why do we talk about the cross so much and the manger so little?" This brought to mind a couple of things. One, what a brilliant question brought forth from such innocence. Remember when our grade school teachers taught us that there are no bad questions? The other concept it brought to mind is something from Divinity School. I think the cross and the manger are in fellowship with one another. Martin Luther would often say that they are made of the very same wood. Luther argued that our blood stained sin is in the wood of the cross.

But, do we also remind ourselves that the blood that birthed Jesus, Mary's blood was love? God closed the gap between human existence and the divine with blood and tears by sending God in human form, to dwell not only among us, but within us. Can you imagine the skinned knees of a toddler Jesus learning to walk and run? This Advent and Christmas Season I invite you to think fully into the gift of humanity that God gave us and that Mary birthed. Take a moment to breathe in the holiness of such a gift. Imagine how much you are loved by God and share that love with someone who needs it.

The purpose of Advent is to remember that Christ has already come and is coming. God splits the heavens and comes to us in our deepest need, our humanity. Let us be the hands and feet of Christ in the world this season and beyond,

### Luke 2:1-14, (15-20)

In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. (This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria.) All went to their own towns to be registered.

Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.

In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for see--I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger."

And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favors!"

When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us."

So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger. When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this child; and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them. But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart. The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them.

Please contact the church office with any updates or corrections to your contact information. Heidi Haney is leading this project and she has already started to ask for contact information as well.




We are considering how to include photo directory in this project. As a "Fun & Quirky Church", we are considering taking informal fun and quirky photos before and after

Worship With Those Who Mourn

There is a growing attentiveness to the needs of people who are blue at Christmas. Increasing numbers of churches are creating sacred space for people living through dark times. Such services are reflective, accepting where we really are, and holding out healing and hope.

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### Responding to Transition

### November 7, 2019

Dear Upper Midwest Disciples of Christ:

The last two Regional Minister Search Committee Listening Sessions will be held this Sunday, November 10—one at Broadway Christian Church, Council Bluffs (3:30 pm), and the other at Plymouth Creek Christian Church in Minneapolis area (2:00 pm). You may also give your feedback to the Search Committee through an online survey that has been sent our entire UMW email list. I strongly encourage you to fill out the online survey, if you have not attended a listening session.

My sense is, after attending several listening sessions and visiting with others in between, is our clergy and congregants, in general, fall into two broad groups. One is the group of those who remember when there were five, full time, regional staff clergy members, and these dedicated staff members visited congregations, attended

clergy cluster meetings, and in many other ways were physically present around the Upper Midwest Christian Church.


The second group, in general, are those congregants and clergy, young and old, across the Upper Midwest Region who understand we now have 1.5, full-time equivalent regional staff clergy members, which makes it impossible to personally visit every congregation, or every clergy cluster meeting—although we try hard to be present for clergy gatherings.

This is not a new reality. It has been unfolding for years. It is not unique to the Upper Midwest Region. It is not unique to the Disciples of Christ. It is a reality of being church today in our country as we travel through what some are calling "The Great Transition," a time in which how we being and doing church in changing in a degree of magnitude not seen since The Protestant Reformation, 500 years ago.

The ways we organize to be church and how we offer ministry as church are radically different than in 1951, the year I was born, or in 1921, the year my father was born. How we respond to this significantly different reality is the key to being church in the years to come. Not every denomination or congregation will respond in the same way. However, there is one reality that is essential—to be Church we must love one another. There is no option to that reality. That is why, as Disciples of Christ, we welcome all to the Table of our Lord.
